Foundations of Leadership

This two-day session is designed to introduce administrators to leadership and organizational effectiveness. On day one, the administrator is reintroduced to concepts and theories that they must fully understand in order to be an effective leader. The concepts/theories include: open systems model; framework for child welfare practice; qualities of leadership and leadership styles; and use of information and data in decision-making and strategic planning.

On day two, administrators are introduced to Organizational Effectiveness concepts. Administrators will apply the concepts to their agency through an assessment process (using information from day one) and participate in the development of a change plan. The change plan will outline the action steps the leaders need to take in articulating their vision, mission, and values for the agency to staff and key stakeholders. In addition, the change plan will identify how they will engage staff and stakeholders in implementing a strategic framework and strategic initiatives that will support agency outcomes. This workshop is eligible for 12 continuing education credit hours.

WHAT IS A PILOT?

Piloting of a curriculum is a step in the quality assurance process that the Resource Center completes to ensure curriculum is written to best practice for the state and that the content is what the targeted population needs and wants. A workshop is piloted before it is made available for statewide delivery.

When you attend a pilot training you will be asked to participate in an After Action Review. An After Action Review helps the Resource Center determine the success of the curriculum and helps to identify changes to be made to the content and/or flow of the curriculum. During the After Action Review, participants are asked to answer questions related to the content as well as your opinion of the training.
