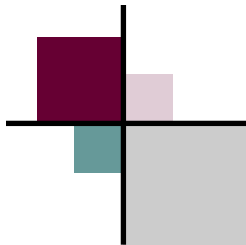

Leadership and the Parallel Process

"It is ... very clear that client issues cannot be resolved by helping systems that repeat the same problems" (Mehr, 1995). In most current theories, it is an accepted belief that all effective leadership begins with a trusting, honest, respectful relationship with employees. Most current methods of working with clients calls for a strength-based, relationship centered approach. This presentation will provide a framework to examine the parallel process between the leader, the employee and the client. Discussion will include understanding the manner in which a leader responds to the worker's behavior. It can provide a model for intervening with the client.
