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<p>Section II: Defining Family Leadership and Exploring the Data</p>	<p>10 minutes</p>	<p>Method of Presentation: Lecture</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Using PowerPoint Slide #7 (Family Leadership) to provide participants with a definition of Family Leadership. • Use PowerPoint Slide #8 (Family Leadership is the key!!) to further stress that family leadership is key to success of the FGDM process and that we need to take a critical look at, not only how, but how effectively we empower families and place them in the leadership role. • Referencing Handout #2 (Family Group Survey), Handout #3 (Statewide Family Group Decision Making Conference Survey Report July – December 2010), PowerPoint Slides #9-10 (Measuring Family Leadership), review the items on the Family Group Survey that are used to measure Family Leadership. • Reference Handout #3 (Statewide Family Group Decision Making Conference Survey Report July – December 2010), Handout #4 (Family Group Decision Making Conference Survey Report January 01, 2011 - June 30, 2011), and PowerPoint Slide #11 (Family Leadership Data) to review the data related to Family Leadership. Make sure to explain the difference between mean, median and mode so that participants understand the meaning of the numbers.
