## FGDM Participants' Perception of Safety and How the Presence of Domestic Violence May Impact It

## Family Group Decision Making Statewide Evaluation



Statewide Meeting April 9, 2019

Between July 1, 2015 and June 30, 2018 counties submitted data about 3,185 family conferences to the FGDM Statewide Evaluation. **Domestic violence** services/supports were included in four percent of the family plans developed during the conferences. (Table 1).

Three items from the Family Group Conference Survey relate to participants' perception of safety in the conference (Table 2). Overall, participants tend to agree or strongly agree with these items indicating that the conferences were conducted in a way that promoted a sense of safety among participants. Overall, children/youth who were the focus of the conference were slightly less likely to report agreement with the safety-related items compared to all of the participants and to other natural supports.

There were thirteen children/youth whose plans included Domestic Violence services/supports who responded to the survey. These children /youth reported the lowest levels of agreement with the safety-related items on the Survey.
